Although I already had two dogs and a cat, I was doing a fair amount of traveling and needed Kolohé, my cat, needed a companion while I was away. Driving to the Animal Shelter, I thought to myself "What was I looking for?" No specific color, sex or breed came to mind. I concluded I would have to wait and see if there was a connection, a bond, some kind of sign from any of the adoptable cats. I do take my pet adoptions very seriously. Every adopting parent should because a pet is a lifelong commitment and should never be taken lightly.

Arriving at the shelter, I headed straight for the Cattery and looked at every cat before returning to a long-haired, black cat with almond-shaped eyes the color of bright sunlight. She was a beauty. As I started to open her cage door, she bounded forward into my arms and rambled me with her forepaws. She almost knocked me out with the force. OK well maybe she wasn't almost knock me out, but she gave me an instant headache. You could say that was a sign. And for those readers not familiar with cats, biting heads is just one way cats have of marking their possessions. I was hers and I was hooked.

I took Midnight home and introduced her to Kolohé. He was afraid of her. She weighed 6 pounds and he weighed 17. It was funny, but not to him. For months he hugged the walls, slunk around corners and if she came into a room, he would leave. So much for bringing him a companion. For her part, Midnight was quite tame. The first night and many nights thereafter she slept in the corner of my bedroom. Gradually as we bonded, she became less fearful and slept on the floor beside by bed eventually progressing to sleeping on the bed by my feet. Finally, one night, after many months she came up to the crook in my arms and slept real close to me, as she did the remainder of her life. Midnight had come home.

The cortisone worked but unfortunately only for a short time and then the scratching started again. By now it was obvious that she had a chronic problem but I would no longer think of bringing her back to the shelter than I would return a sick child. She was family. So the cortisone shots became the routine therapy. I realized that although it might shorten her life, she would be comfortable and not tearing herself to pieces.

As Midnight and I bonded, she stayed hidden from visitors. Most people never knew I had two cats because they NEVER saw her. Her favorite hiding place was my closet. One day, I became very ill and called 911. Paramedics came barging into my home, making a huge racket shouting for me to identify my whereabouts. They ran into my bedroom and I was still bleeding heavily and could not talk, but oh boy did I notice Midnight.

Midnight came out from where she had been hiding, jumped up on my bed and sat on my pillow. She watched everything the paramedics did and never left my side. I was absolutely astounded. This little cat who was so frightened of everyone was staying right by my side with four strange men shouting instructions in a very chaotic situation. She was NOT leaving my side because she knew something was terribly wrong. She was protecting me. This tiny ball of fluff, afraid of everything, stayed right by my side and never left my bed pillow.

I do think that when you save an animals life by adopting it from a shelter, they know and return the gift. Many such pets become our living, breathing guardian angels. So if I was Midnight's guardian angel in rescuing her, Midnight in turn was my guardian angel.

As Midnight grew older she developed arthritis and the insulin shots were becoming less effective. She became very ill during one of my business trips. When I returned home, she could barely move. The person caring for her in my absence said "She was waiting for you." She slept one final night by my side and then passed to Kitty Heaven.

Midnight had waited for me for one final goodbye. Midnight has been gone several years now and while I have more cats and I love them, Midnight was my protector. I know when it's my time to walk through those pearly gates, she will be waiting T E to protect me once more. Midnight with eyes the color of bright sunshine. MISSION

There may be more than 100,000 homeless cats on Maui. 9th Life Hawaii seeks to compassionately and non-lethally control the cat population by utilizing TNR (Trap, neuter, release). Cats are trapped and neutered and when possible, the cats are returned to their colonies. Volunteer caretakers then continue to monitor the colonies and provide regular supplies of food, water and medication. However, some of our rescues are disabled cats, blind, deaf, or are missing limbs, kittens and cats from colonies that have been under attack by humans or dogs. Other kittens have been dumped in the cane fields that are routinely set on fire as part of the harvesting process. Cane field kittens are never returned to the cane fields after they are neutered. All of these kittens will remain at our sanctuary until a loving home is found. 9th LIFE HAWAII is the only NO-KILL, non-profit, cat rescue on Maui that maintains a sanctuary for those kittens that have no other place to safely stay.

HOUSING DILEMMA ON MAUI

Innocent pets are put to sleep every day because their owners cannot find a home that will be rented to them with pets. Apparently, it is illegal for a landlord to charge an extra pet deposit above and beyond a normal security deposit which can be no greater than one month's rent. This law benefits no one. Because landlords are restricted by Hawaii State Law as to what they can charge for a security deposit, prospective tenants who would willingly pay an extra pet deposit are often forced to give up a loving family member. Most of these family pets are put to sleep. This law benefits no one and directly causes the death of innocent animals. If you agree, let your elected officials know. It's time to change this law.

We completely expended the PetSmart grant for spay/neuters that enabled us to sterilize 133 cats in six months. Another foundation has just given us a grant to continue our free spay/neuter program.
